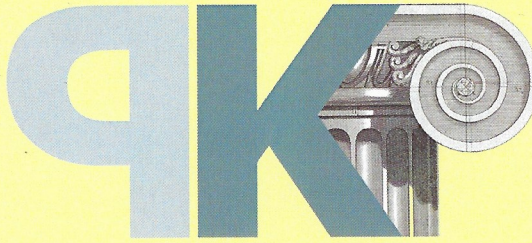

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Since its inception in 1976, the Federal Tax Credit has generated more than **\$84 billion** in the rehabilitation of income producing properties in Kentucky.

From 2001-2016, the Federal Historic Tax Credit has generated:

- More than \$558 million in Kentucky development
- \$112 million in total taxes
- \$11.8 million in local taxes
- \$15.8 million in state taxes
- \$84.4 million in federal taxes
- 345 rehab projects
- 9,583 construction jobs
- 5,048 permanent jobs

Since the Kentucky Historic Tax Credit was implemented in 2005:

- 813 buildings across the state have been rehabilitated
- \$484 million in private funds have been invested in historic buildings, leveraged through \$36.1 million in credits
- \$1.2 million per commercial project and \$120,097 per residential project has been invested on average.
